### Summary

## Situation

- 4. Since the publication of the Airport White Paper in 2003 the Council has expressed its opposition to a second runway at Stansted Airport with a strapline at the foot of every letter and agenda saying "Uttlesford Says No to More Runways at Stansted". This is in addition to extensive lobbying and the vigorous efforts of the Council and its partners through the planning process.
- 5. With the withdrawal of the planning application for a second runway, and the clear statement of government intentions, it is considered that the slogan should now be removed.
- 6. Retention of the strapline would appear incongruous at a time when there is no obvious threat from airport expansion indeed traffic continues to decline. The slogan has done its job and Officers consider its removal would be appropriate.
- 7. The Government will be reviewing aviation policy (a Bill on Airport Economic Regulation forms part of the Queen's Speech for example) and the Council will need to engage in the debate with Government policymakers at the appropriate time.
