tree at The Gables, Carmen Street, Great

Summary

1. This report seeks the committee's consideration of a notification of intent to fell a Horse Chestnut tree, within a conservation area at The Gables, Carmen Street, Great Chesterford [appendix 1: Location plan]. The notification has been given by the Head of Planning & Building Services who has a declared ownership interest in the site.

That no objection be raised to the felling of the horse chestnut tree.

Situation


- 2. The tree has been inspected by the Council's Landscape Officer and found to be a mature specimen of some 16m in height. The tree has been previously pollarded at a height of approximately 2 metres with the last re-pollarding undertaken some 30 + years ago. The substantial poles that have since grown are placing considerable loading on the pollard head which is at some risk of collapse. Re-pollarding would reduce the weight but result in large cut wounds susceptible to decay and unable to support new pole growth. In addition, emerging fungal fruit bodies were found in an area at the base of the main stem. The full extent of this butt decay has not been established, but the medium to long term viability of retaining the tree is in doubt.
- 3. The tree is situated in the rear garden of the property and whilst the upper parts of the crown can be seen from selected vantage points in Carmen Street the tree is not a prominent feature in the street scene.
- 4. The tree is growing within 2m of a single storey extension of the dwelling, and within 3m of a 2m high brick boundary wall [Appendix 2: photograph.] No visual evidence was found at the time of inspection of the tree having caused damage to the fabric of the building or the garden wall, however, some limited root disturbance to the surface of an adjacent tarmacadam hard standing is evident.
- 5. Taking account of the condition of the tree, its proximity to the dwelling, and its limited visibility from public vantage points, it is not considered appropriate to make the tree the subject of a tree preservation order.


