# **Domestic Waste & Recycling 2007/08**

- 3. The figures above are currently awaiting audit approval from Essex County Council. When they are verified, Uttlesford will be one of the top performing Local Authorities in the Country.
- 4. In 2006/07 Uttlesford were positioned at 34 out of 273 collection authorities on the recycling league table. North Kesteven had the highest recycling / composting rate of 55.5%, with South Shropshire coming second with 53.4%.
- 5. In the event that recycling / composting rates remain static, potentially Uttlesford will have the second highest recycling / composting rate behind North Kesteven.

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# The Consultation on the Joint Municipal Waste Strategy for Essex

- In February 2008, the Essex Waste Partnership (this comprises of the County Council and the twelve District and Borough councils of Essex) undertook a threemonth consultation programme on the draft Joint Municipal Waste Strategy for Essex.
- The aims of this consultation were to raise awareness about the draft waste strategy and to provide an opportunity for residents and stakeholders to give feedback on the draft waste strategy, as well as to inform them of the Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) Environmental Report and similarly gather comments.
- The central objective in creating this consultation exercise was to communicate the principles of the draft waste strategy clearly and understandably to Essex residents and stakeholders, including 'hard to reach' groups.
- The main body of the consultation took the form of a questionnaire on the draft waste strategy and SEA document, which was distributed to residents and stakeholders. This was available to all stakeholders through the County Council's Essex Works magazine, at road shows around the County, online and at libraries and Council buildings. All residents and stakeholders therefore had the opportunity to view and comment on the consultation.
- Responses
  - 4,479 questionnaires were returned
  - 16 stakeholders submitted comments
- Provisional Results
  - A substantial majority of those who returned a questionnaire (83%) state that they recycle as much as possible, a significant increase on the previous survey in 2005<sup>1</sup>.
  - A large majority of respondents (80%) say that it is 'very easy' or 'fairly easy' to help the Essex waste Partnership achieve levels of 60% recycling by using current kerbside collection and Recycling Centres for Household Waste to recycle their waste, with only 18% saying that it is 'very difficult' or 'fairly difficult'.
  - Overall, 84% of Essex residents state that they either 'strongly agree' or 'tend to agree' with the proposal that "After all practical recycling and composting has taken place... Essex councils should treat 'black bag' waste by using MBT processes rather than sending the waste directly to landfill."
  - A further 88% would "prefer it if part of the material from the MBT process was used to produce fuel for energy rather than being sent to a landfill site."
