Situation

- 6. The Council has received an approach to amend its licensing conditions to permit the licensing of motor-trikes. The vehicle which has prompted the application is powered by 1300cc VW engine, the vehicle having been purpose built by a German company. The vehicle is to the original manufacturer's specification although safety bars have been added and the vehicle is registered in the United Kingdom.
- 7. Government guidance regarding the specification for vehicle types which may be licensed states that 'the legislation gives local authorities a wide range of discretion over the types of vehicle that they can licence as taxis or private hire vehicles ... normally the best practice is for local licensing authorities to adopt the principle of specifying as many different types of vehicle as possible. Indeed local authorities might usefully set down a range of general criteria, leaving it open to the taxi and PHV trades to put forward vehicles of their own choice which can be shown to meet those criteria. In that way there can be flexibility for new vehicle types to be readily taken into account'.
- 8. The applicant has cited 3 other authorities which license motor-trikes. Officers are not aware of any other authorities that do so although it is known that the Public Carriage Office (Transport for London) license motorcycles as private hire vehicles which are primarily used for airport runs.
