#### **Situation**

- 5. Since the last meeting of this committee I have interviewed 7 drivers for various matters.
- 6. In 3 cases I suspended licences for a period of 2 days for failing to notify the council in writing of penalty points within 7 days. In a further case of the same breach of condition I suspended the driver's licence for a period of 7 days. The reason for this is that this particular driver only works one day a week and a 7 day suspension was necessary to ensure that it was effective.
- 7. In a further case I suspended a driver's licence for a period of 7 days. A complaint had been made regarding the driver's driving. The driver admitted the allegation and accepted that his driving was at the very least careless. Had the driver been observed by a Police office the probability is that he would have been charged with an offence of careless driving. He would have been fine and his licence endorsed. The financial loss which he would suffer based upon income figures which he gate to me would be the equivalent of a fine although of course his licence will not now be endorsed.
- 8. In 2 other cases I took no action as the drivers did notify the council of their points although outside of the 7 day period. In these cases I reminded the drivers of the need to comply strictly with the condition in the future.
