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#### **Situation**

- 5. Since the last meeting of this committee I have interviewed 6 drivers for various matters.
- 6. In 1 case I suspended the licence for a period of 1 day for failing to notify the council in writing of penalty points within 7 days. In a further case of the same breach of condition I suspended the driver's licence for a period of 2 days. In a third case I suspended a driver for a period of 7 days. The reason for this is that this particular driver failed to attend for an interview and the length of the suspension was based upon my knowledge of the average earnings of drivers with the operator for whom the driver worked. Finally I suspended the licence of a driver for 14 days where she failed to attend an interview and I had no information regarding the drivers income save for the fact she told my P.A that she was a full time trainer from which I deduced that private hire driving was not her main occupation.
- 7. With regard to all of these cases the time for appeal has lapsed and no notice of appeal has been received.
- 8. In 2 other cases I took no action as the drivers did notify the council of their points although outside of the 7 day period. In these cases I reminded the drivers of the need to comply strictly with the condition in the future.
