Situation

- 6. The Council adopted its Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) in July 2006. This document sets out the Council's approach to public consultation and involvement in the preparation of the Local Plan, other development plan documents and in the determination of planning applications.
- 7. It is necessary to review the SCI due to changes in national legislation and planning guidance and progress on the Local Plan.
- 8. The key changes to the SCI are as follows:
 - Plan making Following the introduction of the NPPF in 2012 and the new Local Plan Regulations future Development Plan Documents should be prepared as a single Local Plan rather than a series of separate documents as under the previous Local Development Framework system. The text within the SCI has been amended to reflect these changes.
 - Localism Act Since adoption of the SCI in 2006 the Localism Act 2011 has been enacted and has introduced Neighbourhood Development Plans which enable local communities to plan for future development in their area, so long as their plan is in conformity with the Council's Local Plan. The Localism Act also introduced the Duty to Cooperate which requires planning authorities and other public bodies to actively engage and work jointly on strategic matters. This legislation is mentioned in the SCI update.
 - Methods of Consultation some of the methods of consultation mentioned in the Adopted 2006 SCI have been amended to reflect how the Council carries out consultation now, such as less reliance on hard copy documents and encouraging the use of the Council's on-line consultation portal, Objective.
- 9. As there is no statutory requirements regarding SCI consultation it is proposed that the updated SCI will undergo a consultation which will involve notifying all statutory consultees and adjoining district, town and parish councils via email/letter of the consultation period and putting a notice on the Council's website. The consultation period will run for 6 weeks.
- 10. Following consultation the revised SCI will go to Cabinet for approval.
- 11. The proposed updated version of the SCI forms Appendix A to this report.
