## SAFFRON WALDEN MUSEUM CURATOR'S QUARTERLY REPORT July - September 2009

# 1 Museum Management and Staff

#### 1.1 Management

#### Heritage Quest Centre

Since the announcement by Sainsbury's of their intention to build a store on the adjacent development site, subject to planning permission, the tender for construction has been put on hold pending negotiations between the Council, Museum Society, Sainsbury's and the Heritage Lottery Fund. Meanwhile other major funding partners have been briefed on the situation, and a watch is being kept on matching funding which may be put at risk by prolonged delays.

## **Accreditation Biennial Return**

Museums accredited by the MLA must complete a biennial return with reports on progress against 'areas for improvement'. The Museum's return, submitted in September, contained a brief report on the HQC project which will deliver improvements required in collections care and documentation. The Forward Plan will also need reviewing once present issues with the HQC project have been resolved. Also in compliance with accreditation, microfilm security copies of the three latest completed Accession Registers, covering acquisitions up to 2008, have been made by Essex Record Office.

# <u>1.2 Staff</u>

Learning Officer Aleksandra Jones left in August to relocate to Devon, after an extremely successful year in which she had contributed much to education, activities and the Museum in general. Appointment of a successor is currently suspended, consequently school bookings for taught sessions are being lost. Volunteer Chris Phillips and other Museum staff are maintaining the Museum Minis programme and family holiday activities this term, and school loan boxes continue to be available.

## **1.3 Volunteers and Work Experience**

Tony Morton is working with Natural Sciences Officer to input data from ecological surveys of verges into the Special Roadside Verges database. Caroline Clements SWCHS had some work experience in July, Rosie Brown assisted the Conservation Officer on various projects, Ian Sharpe and Hamish McIlwrick sorted out lantern slides and other photographic glass plates (the CJE collection and Samuel Wenman's), and Anne Wade worked on the textile collection. The Museum also hosted several short-term student volunteers over the summer. Christine Housden has joined the desk volunteers.

#### 1.5 Health & Safety

Fire extinguishers were serviced. Two new water fire extinguishers were placed in the natural history store and inside the entrance to the roof space; if used they will cause less damage to specimens than foam. A Fire Officer visited the Museum to discuss matters with the JOSHRAC coordinator from UDC, and carry out an inspection under the new fire safety legislation. The only new requirement is that Emergency Lighting needs to be tested regularly by the Security Officer (in addition to tests by Chubb) and this is now in hand.

# 2 Buildings and Site

#### 2.1 Museum Building

A new iron grille lockable gate has been fitted at the end of the Museum to close off the passage to the fire escapes and rear of the building when the Museum is unoccupied. Pest trapping in natural history stores and galleries took place in August. Halogen bulbs throughout the Museum started a programme of replacement by extremely low energy LED\_bulbs, in conjunction with Jake Roos from UDC.

#### 2.2 <u>Laboratory/Schoolroom</u>

A new gutter was installed outside the Lab office as the old one has been filling with leaves and rainwater, and damaging the walls by soaking through to the Conservation Officer's office.

#### 2.5 Grounds and Castle Site

Contractors' work on the wall behind 30-34 Castle Street has been progressing steadily and is expected to finish soon. Arrangements are in hand with Environmental Services and other Castle Street residents for the removal of the overgrown sycamore behind the Museum on 12-13 October. The Conservation freezer in the Workshop was defrosted and cleaned. Vandals damaged new signage in the Museum grounds and overturned the contractors' portaloo on several occasions. All instances have been reported to the Police, and signs have been replaced with more secure fixings.

The transfer completed 2 July 2009 (Exit Form: 42), no museums or galleries having responded to the notice placed in the *Museums Journal*.

## Len Pole's ethnography project

Len Pole's Fellowship project concluded on 18 September with a verbal report to Essex Museum Workers Group and submission of reports to the Museums Association, who commented on its success of Len's project and asked Len to give a presentation at MA Conference in London on 5 October. To continue and extend this work with world cultures collections in museums in the region, a new bid to the *Effective Collections* programme has been submitted and we have just heard that our application has been successful. Discussion with the MA will take place over the next few months to plan the scope of the project with partner museums, and it is expected to start in April 2010.

## 3.8 Insurance

Jonathan Dutton has completed most of his survey of the ceramics and glass collections, and we are awaiting his return to finish the work during the autumn.

# 4 Displays and Visitor Services

## 4.1 Permanent Galleries

The duck-billed platypus in the *Origins* exhibition proved to be very popular with visitors and it has been put on display in the Victorian Museum Workroom on the natural history gallery.

Refurbishment of the Ceramics gallery, starting with the Chinese export porcelain and English soft

paste porcelain case has begun and involves painting the case interiors matte light blue. Exhibits meanwhile are being cleaned and packed in storage, and a review of label texts and production of new labels is due to start.

## 4.2 Temporary Exhibitions

*Origins of the Museum Collections, Creatures and Cultures from around the World* ended on 31 August 2009.

*Henry Moore: Sheep* (etchings, sculpture and found works) opened on 12 September 2009, with a private view for members and guests on Friday 11 September. It was co-curated by staff from the Henry Moore Foundation and Carla Purdue, Documentation & Exhibitions Officer.
