CURATOR'S QUARTERLY REPORT April - June 2010

1 Museum Management and Staff

1.1 Management

Heritage Quest Centre

The project remains 'on hold' as the Council has not yet set the date for its decision on Sainsbury's planning application. Viridor Credits have informed us that due to the delay and the change in constitution of the Museum Society, we will need to reapply for our two grants from Viridor (total £100,000) once we know which site we are to build on. Low key fundraising continues.

Consultant for restructure of Museum Service

There has been no further work with Tim Heathcote while we wait for the outcome of his initial report and discussions with senior Council officers; this will set the timetable for the rest of the project.

1.2 Staff

As reported last quarter, Susan Collier returned in April and is now job-sharing the Documentation & Exhibition Officer's post with Carla Purdue. Tony Carter, Security Officer, retires at the end of July so a one-year contract for a part-time Security Officer has been advertised internally (i.e. within the Council). Permission has also been given for a temporary part-time Learning Officer post to be advertised; both these are fixed-term contracts while the outcome of the service review is unknown.

1.3 Volunteers and Work Experience

Volunteers Hilary Walker, Judy Brook, Hamish McIlwrick, David Nash, Ian Sharpe and Chris Baker continue to help with collections and many other tasks behind-the-scenes. Conservation student Babette Willis is on a seven-week placement assisting in the lab from the University of Lincoln. Alexia Michaelides from Herts & Essex Grammar School undertook a two- week placement in the Lab. Maddie Sharman of SWCHS assisted with some events. Chris Phillips has assisted with education activities. The team of desk volunteers remain indispensable, although fewer are now available on Sundays and Bank Holidays.

1.5 Health & Safety

Following the Fire training in April, the Security Officer sprung a surprise Fire Drill in June, with a school present. Special thanks must go to volunteer Hamish McIlwrick who took the role of a disabled visitor requiring the stair-climber. Evacuation was successfully completed although it threw up some minor practical issues in wheeling the stair-climber onto the external fire escape steps.

In May there was a spate of instances of minor vandalism outside – the security light over the drive was wrenched from the cottage wall and the hook for the fire escape gate was pulled out of the brick wall – and there were a few instances of 'nuisance' behaviour by groups of teenagers in the Museum. Staff informed community police and the Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Officer, and so far the problem has not reoccurred.

The air-conditioning unit in the Natural History store received its annual service in May, and the Emergency Plan was updated and reprinted.

2 Buildings and Site

2.1 Museum Building

Martin Stocks has obtained a quote from a company specializing in safety equipment for buildings, for a suitable safety harness for working on the roof (primarily to clear leaves and snow). This is now with the Planning Conservation Officer for approval, although listed building consent will also be required.

The Natural History galley and Victorian Museum Workroom were cleaned and checked for pests by Natural Sciences Officer and Support Worker. A UDC Pest Control Officer applied contact pesticide to museum stores, galleries and offices in order to reduce the incidence of insect pests, as part of routine conservation procedures.

2.4 40 Castle Street

Fence repairs have been completed.

2.5 Grounds and Castle Site

The permanent security fence for the north boundary wall is understood to have been ordered. The temporary fence remains until the permanent fence is in place. Urgent tree surgery work resulting from a UDC survey of the condition of trees on the site took place at the end of June. Further work is being considered by UDC committee in July. A new frost cover for the erratic boulder was made to measure.

Ethnographic collections: Len Pole's Effective Collections project and Wedge collection

Following planning and meetings between Len Pole, the Curator (project manager), Susan Collier and Alison Porter (project coach on behalf of Museums Association), the project got underway with a meeting of museum partners on 23 June also attended by Simon Floyd, SHARE programme manager from the East of England Museum Hub. Many potential strands of work and use of world cultures collections were identified, and the arrangements are now being made for Len's programme of collections review visits to partner museums over the summer. This will result in a Work Plan to be implemented autumn 2010 – spring 2011 to improve use of world cultures collections through interpretation, displays, learning activities and loans.

Meanwhile Carla Purdue and the Curator are working with the National Museum of Australia to prepare a specification for photographing the Wedge collection (to be funded by the National Museum of Australia). Once the specification is agreed in July, quotations from photographers will be sought and it is hoped that the work will be done in the autumn.

4 Displays and Visitor Services

4.1 Permanent Galleries

Work on new low-energy display lighting in the Ceramics Gallery has also been completed and the programme of display lighting upgrades, funded by the Museum Society, continues with the Great Hall natural history and geology displays, which have given some trouble, with more to be done later.

Work is continuing with replacing the interpretation and labels in the Ceramics Gallery. Useful additional information has been found regarding several pieces on display in the European tin-glazed earthenware section, and labels are being amended. The re-display and renumbering of pieces in the first section of late 18th century earthenware has been completed and labels are in production.

4.2 Temporary Exhibitions

The *Silks of Life* exhibition will close on 4 July, and reopen in Bishop's Stortford Rhodes Centre on 9 July. The next exhibition *England at Leisure* opens on 17 July and is a touring exhibition of photographs from English Heritage, supported by objects from the Museum's collections.

Six potters met staff to arrange the forthcoming selling exhibition of ceramics. The Documentation & Exhibitions Officers are working on the temporary exhibition programme for 2011-2012.

Publicity, Marketing and Website

The Museum enjoyed excellent coverage in the local media around its 175th birthday on 12 May. BBC Radio Essex broadcast a series of short interviews, and a podcast on the Museum and its collections is on their website. Discussions also took place on publicity opportunities with Saffron Screen, and the Museum was featured in the Saffron Walden Initiative's film on 'a day in the life of Saffron Walden' on 18 May. A large new banner (with planning permission) and posters outside and inside the Museum highlight the 175th birthday. The VAQAS award, jointly with Bridge End Garden, received press cover and *Uttlesford Life* regularly covers news of Museum activities. The Museum has been entered for the Essex Tourism Awards for Excellence scheme supported by Archant News.
