CURATOR'S QUARTERLY REPORT October-December 2011

1 Museum Management and Staff

1.1 Management

Museum Development Plan

Plans are evolving for a new purpose-built store at the Newport depot site, meanwhile a public consultation has been launched on developing the Museum. A letter has been sent to all donors to the Heritage Quest Centre project, asking if they would be willing for their donation to go towards the alternative development plans, and the messages of support received have been encouraging.

1.2 Staff

It is with much sadness and with gratitude for his years of service to the Museum, that we record the sudden death of Roger Kirkpatrick, Sunday and Casual Assistant, on 6th December. A tribute to Roger will appear in the next Museum Society Newsletter; condolences have been sent to Roseanne Kirkpatrick.

Susan Collier, Documentation & Exhibitions Officer, moved to a new post in Peterborough in October, after 4 years at Saffron Walden Museum. Susan will be much missed, but we are fortunate to have Carla Purdue, who has been job-sharing the role with Susan, to take over the post full-time.

Gemma Tully, Learning Officer, is currently taking a sabbatical in Egypt to undertake a post-graduate research project for a university in Berlin from mid-November to Mid-February. Gemma has therefore concentrated her Museum time (two days per week) into the early half of the Autumn term and late half of the Spring term, when schools are most inclined to visit.

1.3 Volunteers and Work Experience

Lucy Webb, a History of Art graduate, started working one day a week until gaining employment at the University of Cambridge library. Chris Baker, Ian Sharpe, and Hamish McIlwrick continue to help with collections and other work. Joshua Parker helped on the Town Hall art and photograph survey and database and left to pursue Open University. Catie Moon, who is qualified in working with archaeological human remains, has examined the ancient Greek cremation on display and will continue a programme of analysing other antiquarian human remains next year. Chris Phillips and Brenda Burch assisted with half-term family activities, Christmas tree decorating and Hallowe'en storytelling with support from Delia Delderfield and Jenny Gibsone. Christine Sharpe's help has been invaluable to the 'Uttlesford Sporting Heroes' project for 2012; she has compiled a mailing list of contacts for all the district's sports clubs, of which there are over two hundred.

1.5 Health & Safety

Saffron Security carried out a service of the intruder alarms. Broken emergency lights were replaced by Chubb. Staff practiced operation of the stair lifts, and use of the stair climber equipment for fire evacuation. Newer staff were given a Manual Handling training course by the H&S rep (Conservation Officer). Roof fall arrest system continued to be shown to staff so they could help in a snow emergency on the roof and appropriate PPE and clothing was acquired. A Fire Services officer visited on 27 October and 22 December, and arrangements for a Fire Service familiarisation visit are being made for the New Year.

2 Buildings and Site

2.1 Museum Building

Window frames have been repaired and all exterior paintwork has been repainted on the west and south facades of the Museum building. The work was undertaken by ROALCO under the supervision of Bill Golbourn and colleagues, UDC. Collections were rearranged in the Inorganics store annex to improve access to the table top display cases. Pest trapping took place in the natural history store, ethnography store, costume store, some offices and galleries.

2.3 Newport Store

2.4 40 Castle Street

Paintwork on the north (Castle Street) frontage has been repainted by ROALCO and a small fixed window in the second-floor attic study was replaced by an opening window for easier and cheaper future maintenance

2.5 Grounds and Castle Site

Pavements in Museum Street were resurfaced in November, and access to the site was maintained as far as possible, although inevitably visitor figures suffered a little while the usual access to Museum Street was closed. The new security fence, hand-forged by blacksmith David Gowlett, was finally installed in November and the temporary fencing along the drive removed. This completes the last stage of the work associated with the rebuilding of the north retaining wall in 2009.

3 **Collections and Research**

- 16th century Nuremberg jeton, found at Yardley Hall, Thaxted.
- Collection of domestic objects connected to Martyn Everett and his family includes a shell purse, Victorian skirt hoist, two cigarette lighters and a World War II Civil Defence armband.

3.2 Collections Care and Conservation

Conservation work has largely focussed on the preparation of items for the exhibition *Embroideries* from the East and making of individual mounts and supports. Surface cleaning, photography and object marking was carried out for a number of new acquisitions to the collection, and this also applied to the Wisbech Museum's objects which are part of the Effective Collections project.

Local History Photographic Collections Project (Museum Society funded)

For the period 1 October – 21 November 2011, Carla Purdue, Documentation and Exhibition Officer, completed scanning and attaching 1,089 images to Modes. To date 2,694 images have been scanned and attached, location confirmed and record completed. All of the core photograph collection has now been scanned, and a round-up and attaching of the final images is in progress with the assistance of a volunteer, Chris Baker.

Effective Collections (World Cultures project)

Carla Purdue has taken over Susan Collier's place this project, working with the Curator and Len

Pole. Most of the five museums involved now have their object data for the website on eHive and work on the website specification will continue on the New Year.

3.7 Research

2 research visits in person, in addition to regular collections volunteers, including:

- Libby Gibsone and students, studying and sketching corsets from the collection.
- Maps of Thaxted.

The Curator and local geologist Gerald Lucy undertook a Saturday morning field trip in response to a request from local detectorists and historians to check a large sarsen stone which had been unearthed at a farm near Elsenham. The stone turned out to be a naturally-occurring glacial erratic, of geological rather than archaeological interest.

4 Displays and Visitor Services

4.1 Permanent Galleries

The Egyptian gallery was completed and opened on 4 November with a small social event for invited guests. Thanks to the efforts of Learning Officer Gemma Tully, Museum staff and researchers, and funding from the Museum Society, the collections have been redisplayed incorporating new research and objects not previously on show, with new fibre-optic lighting.

4.2 Temporary Exhibitions

The exhibition *The Great War 1914 – 1918: An Exhibition of Home Life and Service* acted as inspiration for half-term activities in October (Wounded Heroes and Women at War) and was brought to life on 5 November by three members of the 10th Essex Regiment Group who came in role as 'tommies' and an officer with equipment. *Embroideries from the East*, which showcases a recent generous and colourful donation of embroidered textiles by Doreen Hull, was opened by the Mayor on 12 December at the Museum Society's Christmas Social which was very well attended.

4.3 Visitor Services

With the Learning Officer on a research programme in Egypt from mid November to February 2012, her teaching days (= 2 a week) were compressed into the early part of the term, concentrating on Ancient Egypt, plus Stone/Bronze and Iron Ages, Childhood and Toys. She also taught off site at Newport Primary School covering Tudors and Victorians. Other staff and volunteers covered remaining education-related activities including school loan boxes.

Visitors are all those visiting the Museum in person, including activities and events in the grounds **Users** are all those using the Museum Service, including:

on-site (visitors, as above),

off-site (attending talk, display or other off-site activity by Museum staff)

and 'remotely' (information, research enquiries and services by phone, fax, email, letter and website visits or 'Pageviews'. There were 2,096 Pageviews this quarter.

Comment on this quarter's results

Visitor figures are within 2.5% of target. The sporadic closure of Museum Street due to Highways works in November is known to have deterred some visitors, and school class sizes for group visits have been relatively small this term (average 27).

User figures are 12% over target, due mainly to sustained level of website visitors. Publicity surrounding the launch of the Museum's revised development plans and public consultation may have contributed to this. Levels of remote enquiries on the collections (77) remain high compared to numbers of researchers visiting in person, which was relatively low (2) this quarter.

Future Programme, January - March 2012

1 Museum Management and Staff

Awaiting resolution of staffing arrangements for coming financial year, and progress with the development plan for the Museum.

2 **Buildings and Site**

Resolution of insurance claim and work on gateway, following a minor accident on New Year's Day which rendered one brick pillar unsafe, necessitating its demolition.

3 Collections and Research

There will be an upgrade to the Modes XML databases, and work selecting sporting items from the collections for a forthcoming exhibition sporting heroes. The Effective Collections project on world cultures collections continues (Curator and Documentation & Exhibitions Officer).

4 Displays and Visitor Services

Planning for 'Sparks will Fly at Walden Castle' Cultural Olympiad event on 19 May and various projects and workshops leading up to this, notably the 'Local Sporting Heroes' initiative to be launched in partnership with the district's four libraries by Team Essex Ambassador Chloe Rogers on 13 January.
