Services and charges

- The Council's fees and charges are set out in the budget book, a copy of which is sent to every councillor.
- The information obtained for the working group shows that charges are broadly in line with those of our neighbours. However, the following table highlights some key issues that have come out of the review. The working group considers these should be referred to the relevant Committees for attention and appropriate action:

Concessions

In terms of concessions, the review found that, whilst there are concessions for some services, there is no rationale behind them. The percentage discount varies from one service to another and the terminology for qualification is not consistent.

- The working group favours a standard level of discount and suggests 50% discount for those on state benefits. This is the terminology used by some neighbouring authorities.
- The working group also questions the need for concessions for over 65s, who are not necessarily those in most financial need.
